Technical Considerations/Comments

Based on information from the Department of Human Resources, there are seven group homes which are operated by area mental health programs through contracts with other agencies which would be affected by this legislation. Four of these homes are licensed under G.S. 131, which enable their residents to receive Special Assistance payments, and all the residents of these group homes do receive the assistance payments. There are 17 residents in the remaining three group homes who would become eligible for assistance payments under this legislation. The average monthly Special Assistance payment is \$324.50. If all 17 residents were to apply and receive the assistance payments, the annualized cost would be \$66,157. Half of these funds would come from state general fund dollars and half from county funds. The Department anticipates being able to meet these additional costs without additional appropriations.

It should be noted that the Department requested and received an Attorney General's opinion as to whether the current law would allow payment of Special Assistance funds to residents in the three contracted group homes mentioned above. The opinion stated that under a strict reading of the law, payments would not be allowed. However, under a broader reading, payments would be allowed and, in fact, a strict reading of the law might be subject to constitutional attack.

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
