Sec. 3. The constituent institutions of The University of North Carolina and the North Carolina School of Science and Mathematics shall not enter into any contracts that will affect their use of the State telephone network or any contracts for long distance services in furtherance of the authority granted them by G.S. 62-110(d) and (e) until July 1, 1994.

Sec. 4. This act is effective upon ratification.
