A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT REQUIRING JUST COMPENSATION FOR TAKING OF OUTDOOR ADVERTISING.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

Section 1. Article 11 of Chapter 136 of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new section to read:

"§ 136-131.2. Rights of property owners.

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- (a) No municipality, county government, or other political subdivision of the State shall alter, remove, or cause to be altered or removed, any lawfully established outdoor advertising, as defined in G.S. 136-128(3), without the payment of just compensation.
- Just compensation shall be cash or other legal tender, but shall not include allowing the continuation of outdoor advertising over a specified period of time.

3	<u>(b)</u> <u>This</u>	section shall not apply to a municipality, city, or other political

8		been tolled by litigation.

11		<u>law.</u> "
