6	"( <u>h)</u>	<u>Chara</u>	cter Education Local boards of education shall require the teaching of
7	the following character traits in the public schools:		
8		<u>(1)</u>	Courage Having the determination to do the right thing even when
9			others don't and the strength to follow your conscience rather than the
10			crowd; and attempting difficult things that are worthwhile.
11		<u>(2)</u>	Good judgment Choosing worthy goals and setting proper priorities;
12			thinking through the consequences of your actions; and basing decisions
13			on practical wisdom and good sense.
14		<u>(3)</u>	Integrity Having the inner strength to be truthful, trustworthy, and
15			honest in all things; acting justly and honorably.
16		<u>(4)</u>	Kindness Being considerate, courteous, helpful, and understanding of
17			others; showing care, compassion, friendship, and generosity; and
18			treating others as you would like to be treated.

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1 2 3	<u>(5)</u>	<u>Perseverance. – Being persistent in the pursuit of worthy objectives in</u> <u>spite of difficulty, opposition, or discouragement; and exhibiting</u> patience and having the fortitude to try again when confronted with
4		delays, mistakes, or failures.
5	<u>(6)</u>	<u>Respect. – Showing high regard for authority, for other people, for self,</u>
6	<u>(0)</u>	for property, and for country; and understanding that all people have
7		value as human beings.
8	(7)	Responsibility. – Being dependable in carrying out obligations and
9		duties; showing reliability and consistency in words and conduct; being
10		accountable for your own actions; and being committed to active
11		involvement in your community.
12	<u>(8)</u>	Self-Discipline. – Demonstrating hard work and commitment to
13		purpose; regulating yourself for improvement and restraining from
14		inappropriate behaviors; being in proper control of your words, actions,
15		impulses, and desires; choosing abstinence from premarital sex, drugs,
16		alcohol, and other harmful substances and behaviors; and doing your
17		best in all situations."

19	beginning with t	he 1995-96 school year.
