2	AN ACT TO	CREATE THE BLUE RIBBON STUDY COMMISSION ON THE
3	FUTURE O	F ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT.
4	The General As	sembly of North Carolina enacts:
5	Sectio	on 1. The Blue Ribbon Study Commission on the Future of Economic
6	Development (C	Commission) is created in the General Assembly. The Commission may:
7	(1)	Analyze the current status of economic development efforts in the State,
8		including the roles, responsibilities, strategies, goals, and development
9		plans of (i) programs and organizations that, for State budget purposes,
10		identify economic development as one of their goals, (ii) local economic
11		development departments and regional economic development
12		organizations, (iii) the Board of Governors of The University of North
13		Carolina, (iv) the Economic Development Board of the Department of
14		Commerce established pursuant to G.S. 143B-434, (v) the Governor's
15		Commission on Workforce Preparedness, (vi) the Rural Economic
16		Development Center, and (vii) any other organizations and agencies that
17		have developed strategic plans related to economic development.
18	(2)	Review reports that propose future strategies, goals, or
19		recommendations relating to economic development for North Carolina,

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1		and determine the status of the proposed strategies, goals, and
2 3	(3)	recommendations.
4	(3)	Consider issues regarding planned community acts and partnerships for quality growth.
5	(4)	Evaluate and assess (i) the various strengths and weaknesses of the State
6	(-)	and its component regions, subregions, and, in some cases, individual
7		counties, to determine the development capability of the regions in
8		terms of their environmental, fiscal, and administrative capacity, (ii) the
9		relative status and performance of rural business development as
10		opposed to that in urban areas, and (iii) the status of minority-owned
11		businesses throughout the State.
12	(5)	Study the efforts of other states, especially surrounding states, to
13	(\mathbf{U})	promote economic development and compare the State's economic
14		performance with that of other states.
15	(6)	Select a set of priority development objectives that recognizes the
16	(-)	increasingly competitive economic environment and addresses the
17		changing needs of the State in a more comprehensive manner.
18	(7)	Recommend ways to encourage agencies, organizations, and the leaders
19		in government, industry, education, and cultural affairs to work together
20		for the benefit of the State and for the development of strong economic
21		and cultural relationships with foreign governments, economies, and
22		cultures.
23	(8)	Make recommendations and provide guidance to the Secretary of
24		Commerce, the General Assembly, and the Governor on (i) economic
25		development policy issues, including the use of tax incentives and other
26		incentives to motivate economic development, (ii) the types of activities
27		and programs that should be considered economic development
28		activities and programs for the purpose of receiving State
29		appropriations, (iii) the use of local expenditures for economic
30		development and economic incentives, (iv) the role of institutions of
31		higher education in economic development, and (v) the proper use of
32		State funds to leverage private nonprofit economic development
33		initiatives.
34	(9)	Develop objectives and performance indicators to assess the State's
35		economic development progress.
36	(10)	Develop a strategic business plan for quality growth that sets out goals
37		and policies of the State with regard to economic development and a
38		series of strategies and initiatives to be taken by the State in economic
39		development. The goals of the business plan shall be to increase and
40		maintain the economic vitality of North Carolina through efforts (i) to
41		retain industry and business in the State, (ii) to recruit and develop new
42		industry and business into the State, (iii) to provide small business
43		assistance, job training, and workforce preparedness programs, and (iv)

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1		to invest in infrastructure, both physical (including roads and utilities)	
2		and technological (fiber-optics networks and other information system	
3		links).	
4	Section	on 2. The Blue Ribbon Study Commission on the Future of Economic	
5	Development sh	all consist of 26 members to be appointed as follows:	
6	(1)	Three Senators appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate.	
7	(2)	Three Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House of	
8		Representatives.	
9	(3)	One representative of a nonprofit organization involved in economic	
10		development, appointed by the Governor.	
11	(4)	Two representatives from the private sector in the area of manufacturing	
12		industries, one appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate	
13		and one appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.	
14	(5)	Two representatives from the private sector in the area of finance, one	
15		appointed by the Governor and one appointed by the President Pro	
16		Tempore of the Senate.	
17	(6)	Two representatives from the private sector in the area of energy and	
18		communication utilities, one appointed by the Governor and one	
19		appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.	
20	(7)	Two representatives from the private sector in the area of business	
21		services, one appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and	
22		one appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.	
23	(8)	Two representatives from the private sector in the area of agriculture,	
24		one appointed by the Governor and one appointed by the Speaker of the	
25		House of Representatives.	
26	(9)	Two representatives from the private sector in the area of travel and	
27		tourism, one appointed by the Governor and one appointed by the	
28		President Pro Tempore of the Senate.	
29	(10)	Two representatives of county economic development, one appointed by	
30		the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and one appointed by the	
31		Speaker of the House of Representatives.	
32	(11)	The Secretary of Commerce, or the Secretary's designee, ex officio.	
33	(12)	The Secretary of State, or the Secretary's designee, ex officio.	
34	(13)	The Commissioner of Agriculture, or the Commissioner's designee, ex	
35		offico.	
36	(14)	The President of The University of North Carolina, or the President's	
37		designee, ex officio.	
38	(15)	The President of the North Carolina System of Community Colleges, or	
39		the President's designee, ex officio.	
40		President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of	
41	Representatives each shall select a Cochair. A majority of the Commission shall		
42	constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.		

1 Section 3. Members appointed to the Commission shall serve until the 2 Commission makes its final report. Vacancies on the Commission shall be filled by the 3 same appointing officer who made the original appointments. The Commission shall 4 terminate upon the filing of its final report.

5 Section 4. The Commission may contract for consultant services as provided 6 by G.S. 120-32.02. The Commission may obtain assistance from The University of 7 North Carolina and the Economic Development Board of the Department of Commerce. 8 Upon approval of the Legislative Services Commission, the Legislative Administrative 9 Officer shall assign professional staff from the General Research Division of the General 10 Assembly and clerical staff to assist in the work of the Commission. Clerical staff shall be furnished to the Commission through the offices of House and Senate supervisors of 11 12 clerks. The expenses of employment of the clerical staff shall be borne by the Commission. The Commission may meet in the Legislative Building or the Legislative 13 14 Office Building upon the approval of the Legislative Services Commission. The 15 Commission, while in the discharge of its official duties, may exercise all the powers provided under G.S. 120-19 through G.S. 120-19.4. 16

Section 5. Members of the Commission shall receive per diem, subsistence,and travel allowances as follows:

- (1) Commission members who are also General Assembly members, at the rate established in G.S. 120-3.1.
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(2) Commission members who are officials or employees of the State or local government agencies, at the rate established in G.S. 138-6.

(3) All other Commission members, at the rate established in G.S. 138-5.

24 Section 6. The Commission shall submit a final report of its findings and recommendations to the 1999 General Assembly by filing the report with the President 25 Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives prior to the 26 27 convening of the 1999 General Assembly. The final report shall contain the findings, recommendations, and any legislative proposals of the Commission. If at any time during 28 29 its deliberations the Commission identifies a recommendation that can be implemented 30 through the Administrative Procedures Act, Chapter 150B of the General Statutes, the Commission shall forward that recommendation with the proposed rule change to the 31 32 responsible State agency for immediate consideration.

Section 7. From funds appropriated to the General Assembly, the Legislative
Services Commission may allocate funds for the expenses of the Commission under this
act.

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Section 8. This act is effective when it becomes law.
