A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

2 AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS FOR THE RESTORATION OF THE HISTORIC

WILLIAM PENN HIGH SCHOOL AND AUDITORIUM FOR USE AS AN EDUCATION CENTER.

Whereas, the High Point Normal and Industrial Institute was founded by Quakers and the members of High Point's African-American community in 1891; and

Whereas, during the 1930s, the school became a public high school and renamed for the famous Quaker leader, William Penn; and

Whereas, for many years, it was the only school that offered African-Americans an education; and

Whereas, alumni of the school include: Carl Chavis, World War II hero and Purple Heart recipient; John Coltrane, jazz musician; Sammie Chess, North Carolina's first African-American Superior Court Judge; and Bob Brown, Advisor on Minority Affairs to former President Richard Nixon; and

Whereas, the William Penn High School is a preeminent African-American historic landmark and warrants restoration; Now, therefore,

5 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF NORTH CAROLINA

1	Section	on 1. There is appropriated from the General Fund to The William Penn
2	Foundation, Incorporated, a nonprofit corporation, the sum of two hundred fifty thousand	
3	dollars (\$250,000) for the 1999-2000 fiscal year to provide the corporation with a portion	
4	of the funds needed to restore the William Penn High School and Auditorium. In	
5	addition to providing educational opportunities to the citizens of High Point and serving	
6	as a cultural tourist attraction, the restored school and auditorium may serve as:	
7	(1)	A facility for graduation ceremonies for Guilford Technical Community
8		College.
9	(2)	A day care center and extended educational programming facility for
10		area YMCAs.
11	(3)	A computer lab for the High Point Public Library.
12	(4)	An auditorium for an area middle school.
13	(5)	A facility for civic and art events.
