1	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED				
2	AN ACT TO AMEND THE LAW PERTAINING TO THE SCHOOL HEALTH				
3	CURRICULUM.				
4	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:				
5	Section 1. G.S. 115C-81(e1) reads as rewritten:				
6	"(e1) School Health Education Program to Be Developed and Administered.				
7	(1) A comprehensive school health education program shall be developed				
8	and taught to pupils of the public schools of this State from kindergarten				
9	through ninth grade. This program includes age-appropriate instruction				
10	in the following subject areas, regardless of whether this instruction is				
11	described as, or incorporated into a description of, "family life				
12	education", "family health education", "health education", "family				
13	living", "health", "healthful living curriculum", or "self-esteem":				
14	a. Mental and emotional health;				
15	b. Drug and alcohol abuse prevention;				
16	c. Nutrition;				
17	d. Dental health;				
18	e. Environmental health;				
19	f. Family living;				
20	g. Consumer health;				

1		h. Disease control;
2		i. Growth and development;
3		j. First aid and emergency care, including the teaching of
4		cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and the Heimlich maneuver
5		by using hands-on training with mannequins so that students
6		become proficient in order to pass a test approved by the
7		American Heart Association, or American Red Cross;
8		k. Preventing sexually transmitted diseases, including Acquired
9		Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) virus infection, and other
10		communicable diseases;
11		1. Abstinence until marriage education; <del>and</del>
12		m. Bicycle safety. safety; and
13		n. Any other age appropriate health education curriculum approved
14		by a local school administrative unit.
15		A comprehensive school health education program includes any off-
16		campus component that is part of the curriculum of instruction. A
17		comprehensive school health education program does not include
18		individual consultation or counseling outside of the curriculum of
19		instruction.
20	(2)	The State Board of Education shall supervise the development and
21		operation of a statewide comprehensive school health education
22		program including curriculum development, in-service training
23		provision and promotion of collegiate training, learning material review,
24		and assessment and evaluation of local programs in the same manner as
25		for other programs. The State Board of Education shall adopt objectives
26		for the instruction of the subject areas listed in subdivision (1) of this
27		subsection that are appropriate for each grade level. In addition, the
28		State Board shall approve textbooks and other materials incorporating
29		these objectives that local school administrative units may purchase
30		with State funds. The State Board of Education, through the Department
31		of Public Instruction, shall, on a regular basis, review materials related
32		to these objectives, and distribute these reviews to local school
33		administrative units for their information.
34	(3)	The State Board of Education shall develop objectives for instruction in
35		the prevention of sexually transmitted diseases, including the sexual
36		transmission of Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) virus
37		infection, that includes emphasis on the importance of parental
38		involvement, abstinence from sex until marriage, and avoiding
39		intravenous drug use. Any program developed under this subdivision
40		shall present techniques and strategies to deal with peer pressure and to
41		offer positive reinforcement and shall teach reasons, skills, and
42		strategies for remaining or becoming abstinent from sexual activity; for
43		appropriate grade levels and classes, shall teach that abstinence from

13	(4)		State Board of Education shall evaluate abstinence until marriage
14			ula and their learning materials and shall develop and maintain a
15			mended list of one or more approved abstinence until marriage
16			ula. The State Board may develop an abstinence until marriage
17			m- <u>curriculum</u> to include on the recommended list. The State
18			l of Education shall not select or develop a program curriculum for
19			sion on the recommended list that does not include the positive
20			its of abstinence until marriage and the risks of premarital sexual
21			ty as the primary focus. The State Board shall include on the
22			mended list only programs-curricula that include, in appropriate
23			s and classes, instruction that:
24		a.	Teaches that abstinence from sexual activity outside of marriage
25			is the expected standard for all school-age children;
26		b.	Presents techniques and strategies to deal with peer pressure and
27			offering positive reinforcement;
28		c.	Presents reasons, skills, and strategies for remaining or becoming
29			abstinent from sexual activity;
30		d.	Teaches that abstinence from sexual activity is the only certain
31			means of avoiding out-of-wedlock pregnancy, sexually
32			transmitted diseases, including Acquired Immune Deficiency
33			Syndrome (AIDS), and other associated health and emotional
34			problems;
35		e.	Teaches that a mutually faithful-monogamous heterosexual
36			relationship in the context of marriage-is the best lifelong means of
37			avoiding sexually transmitted diseases, including the sexual
38			transmission of Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS);
39		f.	Teaches the positive benefits of abstinence until marriage and the
40			risks of premarital sexual activity; and
41		g.	Provides opportunities that allow for interaction between the
42		0	parent or legal guardian and the student; and student.

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1		h. Provides factually accurate biological or pathological
2		information that is related to the human reproductive system.
3		Course material and instruction shall be medically accurate. "Medically
4		accurate"means supported by research recognized as accurate and
5		objective by leading medical, psychological, and public health
6		organizations and agencies, and where relevant, tested in clinical trials
7		and published in peer review journals.
8	(5)	The State Board of Education shall make available to all local school
9		administrative units for review by the parents and legal guardians of
10		students enrolled at that unit any State-developed objectives for
11		instruction, any approved textbooks, the list of reviewed materials, and
12		any other State-developed or approved materials that pertain to or are
13		intended to impart information or promote discussion or understanding
14		in regard to the prevention of sexually transmitted diseases, including
15		Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS), to the avoidance of
16		out-of-wedlock pregnancy, or to the abstinence until marriage
17		curriculum. The review period shall extend for at least 60 days before
18		use.
19	(6)	Each local school administrative unit shall provide a comprehensive
20	(0)	school health education program for kindergarten through the ninth
21		grade that meets all the requirements of this subsection and all the
22		objectives established by the State Board. Each local board of education
22		may expand on the subject areas to be included in the program and on the
23		instructional objectives to be met. This expanded program may include a
25		comprehensive sex education program for that local school administrative unit
26		<u>curriculum addressing reproductive health only</u> if all of the following
27		requirements are satisfied:
28		a. Before a comprehensive sex education program an expanded
29		<u>curriculum</u> is adopted, the local board of education shall conduct
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31		a public hearing, after adequately notifying the public of the
32		<ul><li>b. For at least 30 days before this public hearing and during this</li></ul>
33		public hearing, the objectives for this proposed program expanded
34		<u>curriculum</u> and all instructional materials shall be made available
35		for review.
36		c. For at least 30 days after the public hearing, the objectives for the
37		program expanded curriculum and all instructional materials shall
38		remain available for review by parents and legal guardians of
39		students in that local school administrative unit.
40	(7)	Each school year, before students may participate in any portion of $\underline{a}$
41		health education curriculum that pertains to (i) a program that pertains to
42		or is intended to impart information or promote discussion or understanding in
43		regard to the prevention of sexually transmitted diseases, including the

1		sexual transmission of Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS),
2		or to the avoidance of out-of-wedlock pregnancy, (ii) an-abstinence until
3		marriage program, marriage, or (iii) a comprehensive sex education
4		program, curriculum that is expanded beyond a comprehensive school
5		health education program, whether developed by the State or by the
6		local board of education, the parents and legal guardians of those
7		students shall be given an opportunity to review the objectives and
8		materials. Local boards of education shall adopt policies to provide
9		opportunities either for parents and legal guardians to consent or for
10		parents and legal guardians to withhold their consent to the students'
11		participation in any or all of these programs.—the health education
12		curriculum.
13	(8)	Students may receive The health education curriculum may provide for
14		the dissemination of information about where to obtain contraceptives
15		and abortion referral services only in accordance with a local board's
16		policy regarding parental consent. Any instruction within the curriculum
17		concerning the use of contraceptives or prophylactics shall provide
18		accurate statistical information on their effectiveness and failure rates
19		for preventing pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases, including
20		the sexual transmission of acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome
21		(AIDS), in actual use among adolescent populations and shall explain clearly
22		the difference between risk reduction and risk elimination through abstinence.
23	(9)	Contraceptives, including condoms and other devices, shall not be made
24		available or distributed on school property.
25	(10)	School health coordinators may be employed to assist in the instruction
26	. ,	of any portion of the comprehensive school health education program.
27		Where feasible, a school health coordinator should serve more than one
28		local school administrative unit. Each person initially employed as a
29		State-funded school health coordinator after June 30, 1987, shall have a
30		degree in health education."
31	Sectio	on 2. This act becomes effective July 1, 1999.
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
