1 (10)Four persons representing agricultural interests, two to be appointed by 2 the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and two to be appointed by 3 the Speaker of the House of Representatives. Four persons with expertise in alternative energy sources, two to be 4 (11)5 appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and two to be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives. 6 7 The President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each designate a cochair from the General Assembly membership 8 serving on the Commission. The Commission shall meet upon the call of the cochairs. A 9 majority of the Commission shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. 10 11 **SECTION 2.** The Commission shall examine the availability and use of 12 alternative energy sources in North Carolina, including the use of biomass resources. The Commission shall gather data and other information as may be necessary to 13 accomplish the purposes of the Commission and shall work cooperatively with other 14 boards, commissions, and entities, taking advantage of their resources and activities for 15 the provision of useful information and insight. In the course of its study, the 16 Commission may seek input and advice from the Utilities Commission, the Department 17 of Environment and Natural Resources, the Department of Agriculture and Consumer 18 Services, the Attorney General, the Public Staff of the Utilities Commission, and the 19 Energy Policy Council of the Department of Administration. The Commission may 20 also review alternative energy activities conducted in other states and may solicit the 21 22 participation of appropriate federal agencies and foreign governments. 23 In the course of its study and in making its recommendations, the Commission may consider the following subjects: 24 25 Methods to encourage the use of alternative energy sources, such as (1) tax incentives, alternative energy portfolio standards, system benefit 26 programs, and product offerings to retail electricity customers. 27 28 Barriers to distribution and market entry for alternative energy (2) 29 generators. 30 Federal and State regulatory jurisdiction with respect to electric (3) 31 utilities, including potential conflicts and ways to address those 32 conflicts. 33 Environmental benefits and impacts associated with alternative energy (4) generation. 34 35 Assurance of fairness and equity among all electricity customer classes (5) 36 and electric power providers.

SECTION 3. Upon approval of the Legislative Services Commission, the Legislative Services Officer shall assign professional and clerical staff to assist in the work of the Commission. Clerical staff shall be furnished to the Commission through the offices of the House of Representatives and Senate Supervisors of Clerks. The Commission may meet in the Legislative Building or the Legislative Office Building upon the approval of the Legislative Services Commission.

Members of the Commission shall receive per diem, subsistence, and travel allowances as follows:

 (1) Commission members who are members of the General Assembly at the rate established in G.S. 120-3.1.

 (2) Commission members who are officials or employees of the State or of local government agencies at the rate established in G.S. 138-6.

(3) All other Commission members at the rate established in G.S. 138-5.

SECTION 4. The Commission may report its findings and recommendations, if any, to the 2002 Regular Session of the 2001 General Assembly. The Commission shall report its findings and recommendations, if any, to the 2003 General Assembly. Upon filing its report to the 2003 General Assembly, the Commission shall terminate.

SECTION 5. Of the funds appropriated to the General Assembly, the Legislative Services Commission may allocate up to twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) for the 2001-2002 fiscal year and up to twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) for the 2002-2003 fiscal year for the expenses of the Commission.

SECTION 6. This act is effective when it becomes law.
