A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

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2	AN ACT TO MAKE THE STATE DEADLINE FOR APPROVAL OF HAZARD
3	MITIGATION PLANS CONSISTENT WITH THE FEDERAL DEADLINE FOR
4	APPROVAL OF THESE PLANS, AS RECOMMENDED BY THE
5	ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW COMMISSION.
6	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
7	SECTION 1. G.S. $166A-6.01(b)(2)$ reads as rewritten:
8	"(2) Public assistance. – State disaster assistance in the form of public
9	assistance grants may be made available to eligible entities located
10	within the disaster area on the following terms and conditions:
11	a. Eligible entities shall meet the following qualifications:
12	1. The eligible entity suffers a minimum of ten thousand
13	dollars (\$10,000) in uninsurable losses;
14	2. The eligible entity suffers uninsurable losses in an
15	amount equal to or exceeding one-half percent (0.5%) of
16	the annual operating budget;
17	3. For a state of disaster proclaimed pursuant to G.S.
18	166A-6(a) after August 1, 2002, November 1, 2003, the
19	eligible entity shall have a hazard mitigation plan
20	approved pursuant to the Stafford Act; and
21	4. For a state of disaster proclaimed pursuant to G.S.
22	166A-6(a) after August 1, 2002, the eligible entity shall
23	be participating in the National Flood Insurance Program
24	in order to receive public assistance for flooding damage.
25	b. Eligible entities shall be required to provide non-State matching
26	funds equal to twenty-five percent (25%) of the eligible costs of
27	the public assistance grant.

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1	c. An eligible entity that receives a public assistance grant
2	pursuant to this subsection may use the grant for the following
3	purposes only:
4	1. Debris clearance.
5	2. Emergency protective measures.
6	3. Roads and bridges.
7	4. Crisis counseling.
8	5. Assistance with public transportation needs."
9	SECTION 2. This act is effective when it becomes law.
