1	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED		
2	AN ACT TO AMEND THE LAWS RELATING TO THE NORTH CAROLINA		
3	PROGRESS BOARD AND APPROPRIATING FUNDS FOR THE OPERATING		
4	EXPENSES OF THE BOARD.		
5	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:		
6	SECTION 1. G.S. 143B-372.1 reads as rewritten:		
7	"§ 143B-372.1. North Carolina Progress Board.		
8	(a) The North Carolina Progress Board is established. The Board shall be located		
9	administratively in the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina and is		
10	may be located at North Carolina State University, any constituent institution within The		
11	University of North Carolina, or at any institution to which it is invited formally, but		
12	shall exercise all its prescribed statutory powers independently of the Board of		
13	Governors. Governors or the institution at which it resides.		
14	(b) The North Carolina Progress Board shall consist of 21 24 members of		
15	statewide prominence as follows:		
16	(1) The Governor, ex officio;		
17	(2) Eight persons appointed by the Governor, none of whom shall be State		
18	employees or officers;		
19	(3) Four-Five persons appointed by the Speaker of the House of		
20	Representatives, one-two of whom shall be a member-members of the		
21	House of Representatives;		
22	(4) Four <u>Five</u> persons appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the		
23	Senate, one-two of whom shall be a member-members of the Senate;		
24	and		
25	(5) <u>Four Five</u> persons appointed by the North Carolina Progress Board.		
26	(c) The Governor shall be chair of the North Carolina Progress Board. The		
27	Governor shall appoint a vice-chair from among the membership of the North Carolina		
28	Progress Board to serve at the pleasure of the Governor. The North Carolina Progress		

29 Board may elect such other officers as it sees fit.

1 (d) The North Carolina Progress Board shall meet at least twice annually on the 2 call of the chair or as additionally provided by the North Carolina Progress Board. A 3 quorum is <u>11_12</u> members of the Board. Members may not send designees to board 4 meetings, nor may they vote by proxy.

5 Board appointments shall be for terms to begin July 1, 1999, with subsequent (e) 6 appointments to be made as terms expire or resignations occur. Of the Governor's 7 appointments, two shall be for one-year terms, two shall be for two-year terms, two 8 shall be for three-year terms, and two shall be for four-year terms. Of the appointments 9 made by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the President Pro Tempore of the 10 Senate, and the North Carolina Progress Board, one member appointed by each shall be 11 appointed for a one-year term, one member appointed by each shall be appointed for a 12 two-year term, one member appointed by each shall be appointed for a three-year term, 13 and one-two member-members appointed by each shall be appointed for a four-year 14 term. As terms expire, successors shall be appointed for four-year terms.

15 (f) No member may be appointed to more than two consecutive terms. A 16 member of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House vacates 17 membership on the North Carolina Progress Board when that person is no longer a 18 member of the House of Representatives, except that if that person is in office at the 19 expiration of the term of office in the House of Representatives but has not been elected 20 to the next term, that person shall continue to serve until the convening of the regular 21 session. A member of the Senate appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate 22 vacates membership on the North Carolina Progress Board when that person is no 23 longer a member of the Senate, except that if that person is in office at the expiration of 24 the term of office in the Senate but has not been elected to the next term, that person 25 shall continue to serve until the convening of the regular session."

SECTION 2. G.S. 143B-372.2 reads as rewritten:

27 "§ 143B-372.2. Responsibilities.

(a) The General Assembly notes that the Commission for a Competitive NorthCarolina developed goals in the following categories:

38 The Commission for a Competitive North Carolina adopted a report which 39 established major goals and ways to measure progress toward these goals.

40 (a1) The General Assembly finds that the North Carolina Progress Board
41 developed a report that focused on four of the Commission's recommended topics and
42 issued 16 major targets for 2010. The objectives of the targets are to drive the State

3	(b) The C	General Assembly finds that: the following:
4	(1)	The North Carolina economy of the future can provide unparalleled
5		opportunity while maintaining North Carolina's traditional values, if
6		the State pursues the future with clarity of purpose and
7		perseverance; perseverance.
8	(2)	The North Carolina economy is in the midst of a massive transition
9		created by technological changes, global competition, and new
10		production practices; and practices.
11	(3)	In order to maintain employment opportunities, increase income
12		levels, reduce poverty, and generate the public revenues necessary to
13		provide public services, North Carolina must increasingly rely on an
14		economy which adds value to its natural and human resources and
15		provides a diverse mix of products.
16	<u>(4)</u>	Regional Progress Boards, modeled after the North Carolina Progress
17		Board, should be encouraged, and to the extent practicable, funded
18		from local sources, public and private, to ensure that the several
19		regions of North Carolina describe a clear regional vision, with
20		measures, targets, and methods for keeping track of progress toward
21		that regional vision, and each forming a strategic alliance with the
22		North Carolina Progress Board.
23	(c) The N	North Carolina Progress Board shall:
24	(1)	Encourage the <u>a</u> discussion and <u>toward</u> understanding of the critical
25		global global, national, statewide, regional, and local demographic,
26		social, economic, and environmental and trends and conditions that
27		exist or are emerging in North Carolina today, and how those issues
28		will impact living in North Carolina in 10 to 20 years.national social

31	(2)	Examine the report of the Commission for a Competitive North
32		Carolina and the 1997 and February 2000 reports of the North Carolina
33		Progress Board to the General Assembly.the 1997 report of the North

35	(3)	Track the eight issue areas set out in subsection (a) of this section and
36		the objectives set out in subsection (a1) of this section and other issues
37		identified by the Progress Board. The Progress Board may, upon vote
38		of the Board, add to those issues identified by its predecessor
39		Commission and Board;Board.
40	(4)	Hold public hearings and other methods of public participation,
41		including educational and outreach programs, to secure the views of

38	(a) The C	Chancellor of North Carolina State University Upon the recommendation	
39		e Governor shall appoint an Executive Director who shall serve at the	
40		Chancellor. Board and the Governor, but, for administrative purposes,	
41	shall report to the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina. The		
42	Executive Dire	ctor shall report to the North Carolina Progress Board and the	

1 Chancellor. Governor. The Executive Director shall hire or contract with support staff, 2 who shall work at the pleasure of the Executive Director. 3 The Office of State Budget, Planning, and Management shall also provide (b) 4 support, information, reports, and other assistance to the North Carolina Progress Board 5 as requested. 6 (c) Repealed by Session Laws 1999-237, s. 10.12(a), effective June 30, 1999." 7 SECTION 4. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina for the North Carolina Progress Board 8 9 the sum of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) for the 2001-2002 fiscal year and 10 the sum of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) for the 2002-2003 fiscal year for 11 general operating expenses of the North Carolina Progress Board. 12 **SECTION 5.** This act becomes effective July 1, 2001.
