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SECTION 1. G.S. 18B-1001(15) reads as rewritten:

- 8 "(15) Wine-Tasting Permit. A wine-tasting permit authorizes wine tastings 9 on the <u>a</u> premises conducted and supervised by the permittee. <u>holding</u> 10 <u>a retail permit, by the retail permit holder or his employee.</u> A wine 11 tasting consists of the offering of a sample of one or more unfortified 12 wine products, in amounts of no more than one ounce for each sample, 13 without charge, to customers of the business. <u>Any person pouring wine</u> 14 at a wine tasting shall be at least 21 years of age.
 - a. Representatives of the winery, which produced the wine, or-the wine producer producer, a wholesaler, or a wholesaler's employee may assist with the tastings in a manner consistent with existing law. tasting. Assisting with a wine tasting includes:
 - <u>1.</u> <u>Pouring samples for customers.</u>
 - 2. <u>Checking the identification of patrons being served at the</u> wine tasting.

15	a winery special permit allowing the winery or wine producer to give free tastings of its
16 17	wine, and to sell its wine by the glass or in closed containers, at trade shows,
17	conventions, shopping malls, wine festivals, street festivals, holiday festivals,
18	agricultural festivals, balloon races, local fund-raisers, and other similar events
19 20	approved by the Commission." SECTION 4. G.S. 18B-1200 reads as rewritten:
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21	"§ 18B-1200. Construction; findings and <u>purpose.purpose; exceptions.</u>
22	(a) This Article shall be liberally construed and applied to promote its underlying
23	purposes and policies.
24	(b) The underlying purposes and policies of the Article are:
25	(1) To promote the compelling interest of the public in fair business

27	continuation of wine wholesalerships on a fair basis;

35	agreement. Any contract or agreement purporting to do so is void and unenforceable to the extent of that waiver or variance.
