44	family members in the military are met, local boards of education shall collect and report to the
45	State Board of Education by September 30, 2012, the following information for each school in
46	the local school administrative unit:
47	(1) The number of students who have an immediate family member who has
48	served in the reserve or active components of the Armed Forces of the
49	United States since September 1, 2011.
50	(2) Whether during the relevant period the local school administrative unit
51	employed at least one employee trained in the unique needs of children who

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1	have immediate family members in the military. An employee satisfies this
2	requirement if the employee has received training on all of the following:
3	a. The number of children of members of the active or reserve
4	components of the Armed Forces of the United States who live in the
5	local school administrative unit.
6	b. Available curricula on military families.
7	c. The impact of deployments on the emotional and psychological
8	well-being of the children and families.
9	d. Potential warning signs of emotional and mental health disorders,
10	substance use disorders, suicide risks, child maltreatment, or
11	domestic violence.
12	e. Appropriate resources to which students and their families may be
13	referred as needed.
14	f. Scholarships for after-school and enrichment activities available
15	through the United States Department of Defense, the National
16	Guard, or the reserve components of the Armed Forces of the United
17	States for the children of parents who are actively deployed.
18	(3) The frequency with which the employee described in subdivision (2) of this
19	subsection provided training to school administrators, nurses, nurses aides,
20	counselors, social workers, and other personnel in the local school
21	administrative unit during the relevant period, and the number of staff
22	trained.
23	The State Board of Education shall report no later than December 15, 2012, to the
24	Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee and to the House of Representatives and
25	Senate Appropriations Subcommittees on Education on information submitted to it pursuant to
26	this section relating to the needs of students with immediate family members in the military.
