**General Assembly Of North Carolina** Preservation of landowners' water rights. – In carrying out its duty to protect 1 **(7)** 2 water resources, the State shall first identify incentives, voluntary programs, 3 and other nonregulatory initiatives prior to exercising its regulatory authority 4 under Articles 21 and 38 of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes." **SECTION 2.** G.S. 143-215.22 reads as rewritten: 5 6 "§ 143-215.22. Law of riparian rights not changed. 7 Nothing contained in this Part shall change or modify existing common or statutory 8 law with respect to the relative rights of riparian owners concerning the use of surface water in 9 this State. 10 Except for the authority granted to the Governor, the Department, or the (b) 11 Commission under Articles 21 and 38 of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes, the Commission 12 under Part 4 of Article 7 of Chapter 143B of the General Statutes, and the Commission for Public Health under Article 10 of Chapter 130A of the General Statutes, neither the State nor 13 14 any political subdivision of the State shall adopt rules or ordinances to limit a landowner from withdrawing and using water as otherwise allowed under the common or statutory law of the 15 16 State from any of the following: 17 Surface water sources located wholly on the landowner's property, including, (1) 18 but not limited to, impoundments constructed by or owned by the landowner 19 and captured stormwater. 20 Groundwater sources, including, but not limited to, wells constructed on the (2) 21 landowner's property, springs, and artesian wells. 22 Nothing in this section shall be construed to limit the enforcement of State or local 23 laws designed to limit the use or installation of wells for withdrawals in areas with groundwater 24 contamination or to limit the enforcement of State water quality standards." **SECTION 3.** G.S. 143-355.3 is amended by adding a new subsection to read: 25 26 "(f) Nothing in this section shall limit a landowner from withdrawing water for use in 27 28

- agricultural activities, as described in G.S. 106-581.1, when the water is withdrawn from any of the following:
  - Surface water sources located wholly on the landowner's property, including, (1) but not limited to, impoundments constructed by or owned by the landowner and captured stormwater.
  - Groundwater sources, including, but not limited to, wells constructed on the <u>(2)</u> landowner's property, springs, and artesian wells."

**SECTION 4.** This act is effective when it becomes law.

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
