16	the Governor, the General Assembly, the Secretary of Commerce, and other State agencies on				
17	initiatives, programs, and legislation that will continue and increase the role that North				
18	Carolina's military installations, the National Guard, and Reserves play in America's defense				
19	strategy and the	economic health and vitality of the State. The Commission is authorized to:			
20	<u>(1)</u>	Coordinate and provide recommendations to the Governor, General			
21		Assembly, and State agencies to protect North Carolina's military			
22		installations from encroachment or other initiatives that could result in			
23		degradation or restrictions to military operations, training ranges, or			
24		low-level routes.			
25	<u>(2)</u>	Cooperate with military installations to facilitate the military mission,			
26		training, and continued presence of major military installations in the State			
27		and notify the commanding military officer of a military installation and the			
28		governing body in affected counties and municipalities of any economic			
29		development or other projects that may impact military installations.			
30	<u>(3)</u>	Identify and support ways to provide a sound infrastructure, adequate			
31		housing and education, and transition support into North Carolina's			
32		workforce for military members and their families, military retirees, and			
33		veterans.

	and Closure (BRAC), as defined by the Governor and the General
