An approved clinical pharmacist practitioner may 5 collaborate with physicians in determining the appropriate health care for a patient, subject to 6 the provisions of G.S. 90-18.4. is as specified in G.S. 90-85.3A." **SECTION 3.** Article 4A of Chapter 90 of the General Statutes is amended by 7 8 adding a new section to read: 9 "§ 90-85.3A. Practice of pharmacy. 10 A pharmacist is responsible for interpreting and evaluating drug orders, including (a) 11 prescription orders; compounding, dispensing, and labeling prescription drugs and devices; properly and safely storing drugs and devices; maintaining proper records; and controlling 12 13 pharmacy goods and services. A pharmacist may advise and educate patients and health care providers concerning 14 (b) therapeutic values, content, uses, and significant problems of drugs and devices; assess, record, 15 16 and report adverse drug and device reactions; take and record patient histories relating to drug 17 and device therapy; monitor, record, and report drug therapy and device usage; perform drug 18 utilization reviews; and participate in drug and drug source selection and device and device source selection as provided in G.S. 90-85.27 through G.S. 90-85.31. 19 20 An immunizing pharmacist is authorized and permitted to administer drugs as (c) 21 provided in G.S. 90-85.15B. An approved clinical pharmacist practitioner may collaborate with physicians in 22 (d) 23 determining the appropriate health care for a patient, subject to the provisions of G.S. 90-18.4." 24 SECTION 4. Article 4A of Chapter 90 of the General Statutes is amended by 25 adding a new section to read: 26 "§ 90-85.15B. Immunizing pharmacists. Except as provided in subsection (b) of this section, an immunizing pharmacist shall 27 (a) only administer vaccines or immunizations recommended or required by the Centers for 28 29 Disease Control and Prevention to persons at least 18 years of age pursuant to a specific 30 prescription order. 31 An immunizing pharmacist may administer the following vaccinations or (b) 32 immunizations pursuant to a standing order or protocols developed with and overseen by a 33 physician licensed in and whose practice is physically located in North Carolina: 34 (1) Pneumococcal polysaccharide or pneumococcal conjugate vaccines. 35 Herpes zoster vaccine. (2)36 (3) Hepatitis B vaccine. 37 Meningococcal polysaccharide or meningococcal conjugate vaccines. (4) 38 Tetanus-diphtheria, tetanus and diphtheria toxoids and pertussis, tetanus and (5) 39 diphtheria toxoids and acellular pertussis, or tetanus toxoid vaccines. 40 Influenza vaccine pursuant to 21 NCAC 46 .2507 and 21 NCAC 32U .101, (6) which may be administered to patients aged 14 years and older. 41 42 An immunizing pharmacist who administers a vaccine or immunization to any (c) patient pursuant to this section shall do all of the following: 43 44 Maintain a record of any vaccine or immunization administered to the (1)45 patient in a patient profile. Notify within 72 hours after administration the patient's primary care (2)
