10	SECTION 1. The Government Data Analytics Center (GDAC) shall establish a task

13		developmental disabilities as part of the North Carolina Longitudinal Data System (System),

28	SI	ECTION 2. The task force shall study issues related to collecting and	charing		
20 29		individual-level data among agencies through the System, including the Common Follow-Up			
30	System and NC SchoolWorks (P-20W), for the purpose of evaluating and reporting whether				
31		federal and State-supported education and employment programs and services for individuals			
32	with intellectual and developmental disabilities are effective in providing education and				
33	employment opportunities resulting in positive outcomes for those individuals. In doing so, the

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1 2	(2)	Conducting an inventory of the unique individual identifiers used within each agency and determining whether any identifiers need to be added to facilitate		
3		the sharing of data.

5		such as enrollment in postsecondary education or training, attainment of a		
6		postsecondary degree or credential, employment status and earnings, and		
7		poverty and receipt of public assistance.		
8 9	(4)	Establishing a uniform length of time in which individuals are tracked that is sufficient to evaluate long-term outcomes.		
10	(5)	Developing interagency data sharing agreements to facilitate the evaluation of		
11		data and reporting of outcomes.		
12	(6)	Identifying any limitations to sharing data through the System for the purpose		
13		of evaluating programs and services, including ensuring compliance with		
14		State and federal privacy laws, such as the Family Educational Rights and		
15		Privacy Act, the Internal Revenue Code, and the Health Insurance Portability		
16		and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPAA). The task force shall propose best		
17		practices for maximizing data sharing and the evaluation and reporting of data		
18		using the System within the parameters of State and federal privacy laws.		
19	(7)	Developing strategies to facilitate data sharing, evaluation, and reporting of		
20		outcomes of programs and services when the System cannot be utilized under		
21		certain circumstances, such as with small population sample sizes.		
22		TION 3. By October 1, 2018, GDAC shall report to the Joint Legislative		
23	Education Oversight Committee and the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and			
24	Human Services on the results of the study required by this act and any legislative			
25	recommendations from the task force.
